Driving Up Sepsis Awareness At Greystoke

Our observant patients may have spotted a brightly coloured bus parked outside the surgery last month, as Greystoke used its monthly staff development afternoon to focus on an important and increasingly topical health issue: Sepsis. Sepsis is a life-threatening reaction to an infection, which can lead to organ failure and death. It is not a new condition, but has become an NHS priority with greater understanding that early recognition and rapid treatment with antibiotics can save lives

With this in mind, the whole practice team spent the afternoon in small groups working on activities to improve how we as a surgery work efficiently together, and with our ambulance and hospital colleagues, to provide optimal care to patients with suspected Sepsis. We were assisted by the 'MELISSA bus' provided by Health Education North East, which offers a mobile clinical area to simulate treating sick patients. This led to some excellent learning points agreed by the whole team which will be rolled out in the coming weeks.



Whilst any of our practice staff are well trained to deal with patients with suspected Sepsis, we would still advise that Greystoke patients call 999 or go to A&E if they develop any of the following symptoms of Sepsis as part of an infection:

- · acting confused, slurred speech or not making sense
- · blue, pale or blotchy skin, lips or tongue
- a rash that does not fade when you roll a glass over it, the same as meningitis
- difficulty breathing, severe breathlessness or breathing very fast

In babies and young children, it is also important to look for:

- a weak, high-pitched cry that's not like their normal cry
- not responding like they normally do, or not interested in feeding or normal activities
- being sleepier than normal or difficult to wake

We'd like to thank our wonderful patients for their understanding of the importance and benefits of holding these regular staff training afternoons to maintain high standards at Greystoke.
